

Dropping Students Off Late

REMINDER: Students are late after 7:35. They will be marked tardy after 8:05. If your student is tardy, you must come into the office and sign them in. If your child required breakfast they must arrive no later than 7:25 in order to receive and have time to eat breakfast before being sent to class at 7:35. If your child is tardy or if you suspect they may be tardy, and they require a school lunch, please call in before 8:30 am and order a lunch with the front desk/ cafeteria. Once lunches are called in at 8:30, we can not add additional lunches to the count.

Breakfast & Lunch

REMINDER: Breakfast is ordered the day before for the following morning. Lunch is ordered in the morning for the same day. Both meals are ordered by your student while attendance is being taken, first thing in the morning. Neither breakfast nor lunch is ordered automatically (even if your student is on the free/reduced lunch program). Lunches are called into our Middle School kitchen at 8:30 am. If your student comes in later than 8:30 am, they will need to bring a lunch (we do not automatically order lunches/breakfasts). If you suspect you will be late, you can call the front desk and order a lunch for your child. We must receive your call by 8:30 am in order to add the lunch to the days lunch count.

Changing Means of Transportation

REMINDER: Due to the Jessica Lunsford Act, we are no longer able to accept transportation changes via phone calls/ messages, text message, email, or voice mail. A Parent/Guardian must give advance written, dated, and signed notice using the "Transportation Change Form" to the school (Front Desk and homeroom teacher) when requesting a child be released to someone other than the designated person(s) or for any other change made in transportation means. Please note it is not the responsibility of the homeroom teacher to make sure the "Transportation Change Form" is delivered to the Front Desk. There will be no exceptions.

"It is What it is"...

"It is what it is." I hear this ever more frequently. It reminds me of the statement, "Close enough for government work." Both give me the shivers. To me, the statements represent the act of settling.

I know. I also talk about non-resistance (going with the flow). But, I speak about that in relation to change (non-resistance against oncoming change). Settling is not change. It's putting up with an irritant because you believe there is nothing to be done about it. I understand how frustrating it is to deal with irritating situations and feel that your hands are tied.

But what if people like Elizabeth Cady Stanton, a mother of four from upstate New York, and the Quaker abolitionist Lucretia Mott had said, ""It is what it is"? What if they had decided to "just deal with" the denial of women the right to vote and run for public office? There would not be an Elizabeth Dole, Carol Moseley Braun, Hillary Clinton, or Carly Fiorina mentioned in politics in any way.

Women's suffrage (and many other women's issues) was not an "it is what it is" thing for these women. And their initial efforts on July 19–20, 1848, in Seneca Falls, New York were not listened to by many.

Only about 100 people heard the words spoken by Elizabeth Cady Stanton, "I should feel exceedingly diffident to appear before you wholly unused as I am to public speaking, were I not nerved by a sense of right and duty—did I not feel that the time had fully come for the question of woman's wrongs to be laid before the public—did I not believe that woman herself must do this work—for woman alone can understand the height and the depth, the length and the breadth of her own degradation and woe. Man cannot speak for us—because he has been educated to believe that we differ from him so materially, that he cannot judge of our thoughts, feelings and opinions by his own".

From this initial protest, it took another 72 years, 3 main women's rights organizations, and countless efforts by dissatisfied women (and men) for the 19th Amendment, providing full voting rights for women nationally to be ratified on August 26, 1920.

Sometime "it is what it is" shouldn't be. Change may be long in coming, but worth the effort to get the ball rolling in the right direction.











