MENINGOCOCCAL DISEASE

WHAT IS MENINGOCOCCAL DISEASE?

Meningococcal disease is serious illness, caused by bacteria. It is a leading cause of bacterial meningitis in children 2 through 18 years old. Meningitis is an infection of fluid surrounding the brain and the spinal cord. Meningococcal disease also causes blood infections.

IS THERE A VACCINE FOR MENINGOCOCCAL?

Two meningococcal vaccines are available in the U.S.

WHO SHOULD GET MENINGOCOCCAL VACCINE AND WHEN?

The vaccine is recommended for all children at their routine preadolescent visit (11 to 12 years of age). For those who have never had the vaccine, a dose is recommended at high school entry.

HOW CAN YOU LEARN MORE?

5 WAYS TO STAY WELL & PREVENT SPREADING GERMS

- 1. WASH YOUR HANDS OFTEN with soap and water especially after coughing, sneezing or blowing your nose. When used properly, alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- Stay home when sick, especially with flu-like symptoms of fever and cough. Stay home for at least 24 hours after being fever-free without the use of fever reducing medicine.
- 3. Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze and wash your hands. No tissues? Cough and sneeze into your sleeve or elbow.
- 4. Clean surfaces that may be contaminated with germs using household disinfectant cleaners.
- 5. Get a flu shot every year to help prevent seasonal flu.







SCHOOL AGE CHILD CARE

Brevard School Age Child Care programs (SACC) provide district-operated child care programs before and after school, on out of school days, and at select schools during spring and summer breaks. Over 5,500 students are served in the broad range of programs offered at the 55 elementary schools.

While BPS SACC programs are an extension of the school day the focus is on children's developmental needs beyond intellectual development, i.e. social, emotional and physical development. Daily, children have the opportunity to socialize with their peers, have a healthy snack and are able to choose from a wide variety of age appropriate toys and games, dramatic play, manipulatives, art, reading materials and outside play. All centers provide the children the support they need in order to complete homework assignments but academics are not the focus of the majority of our programs.

In addition to the basic services many sites offer district approved enrichment classes. Programs such as art, tennis, golf, music, martial arts, dance, cheerleading, and science are among the activities parents have to choose from. These programs are conducted by district approved sponsors and are provided for an additional fee which is not included in the weekly tuition.



Out-of-school time should be a time for fun, growth, and learning beyond the school walls and are proud of the safe environment and quality service we provide to the children and families of Brevard Public Schools.

Typical hours are from 6:30AM-6:00PM. Some of the schools have a variation of these hours. Further information regarding enrollment, fees, and hours may be obtained by calling the school site where the child is enrolled or by calling the district SACC office at (321) 633-1000 ext 357.

STUDENTS-IN-TRANSITION

MCKINNEY-VENTO ACT

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act is federal legislation that was passed to address growing concerns about the plight of individuals experiencing homelessness. The Act defines "homeless children and youths" as "individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence." Educational issues and requirements related to homelessness are addressed in the law.

DEFINITION OF HOMELESS STUDENTS

- Living in emergency or transitional shelters, FEMA Trailers, abandoned in hospitals
- Sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing or economic hardship or a similar reason; "doubled up"
- Living in cars, parks, campgrounds, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings
- · Living in hotels or motels due to economic hardship
- Awaiting foster care



SCHOOL DISTRICT SERVICES

- Ensure access to school and appropriate services
- Enroll homeless students in school immediately
- Provide counseling if needed
- Provide free lunch
- Provide school supplies if needed
- Provide tutoring services if needed
- Provide transportation to the school of origin when requested and feasible

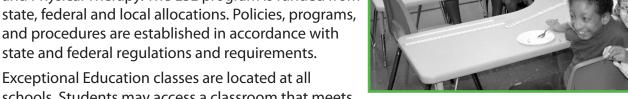

Exceptional Student Education (ESE) services are provided to students who may be classified as Learning Disabled; Intellectually Disabled; Emotionally and Behaviorally Disordered; Hearing Impaired; Visually Impaired; Physically Handicapped; Speech Impaired; Language Impaired; Autism Spectrum Disabled and Gifted. Related services include educationally relevant Occupational Therapy and Physical Therapy. The ESE program is funded from state, federal and local allocations. Policies, programs, and procedures are established in accordance with state and federal regulations and requirements.

BUS TRANSPORTATION

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY:

School buses, by far, are the safest vehicles on the road, with a safety record that is better than any other form of ground transportation. School buses are designed and constructed with more safety features than any other vehicle. Brevard District School's transportation department transports more than 28,000 students each school day on 360 school bus routes. The yellow school bus is the most recognizable school icon in America. Transportation professionals are dedicated to provide safe, reliable and consistent school bus service for Brevard students.

Parents/guardians are responsible for the safe travel of their students during the portions of each trip to and from school and home when the students are not under the custody and control of the school district, including during each trip to and from home and the assigned bus stop when the school district provides bus transportation.

ELIGIBILITY

Students who live 2 miles or more from their assigned school are eligible for school bus transportation. Students shall board the school bus at the nearest designated bus stop. Students will be assigned one school bus stop based on their official/legal home of record. Multiple school bus stops for students are not authorized.

Students who ride the school bus must obey the driver at all times and follow the posted rules for riding the school bus.

Out-of-area students are not authorized school bus transportation.

Multiple bus stops or day care stops are not authorized.

TIPS FOR SCHOOL BUS RIDERS:

School officials, bus operators, parents, and students themselves are all responsible for ensuring that school bus riders follow these safety tips:

AT THE BUS STOP:

- Students and parents are responsible for safety and proper behavior going to and from the stop and while waiting for the bus.
- Parents should not chase the school bus in their vehicle if their student misses the bus. This results in a dangerous situation with a student running to the bus in an effort to board. Parents should take their student to school.
- Students must stand at least 10 feet off the roadway while waiting.
- Students must respect other people's property.
- Students must not push, shove, or engage in horseplay.
- Parents should supervise children at the stop if possible.
- Students must arrive at the bus stop at least five minutes prior to the scheduled pickup time.
- Students must wait for and get off the bus only at approved stop locations.



DURING LOADING AND UNLOADING:

- Always stay away from the 10 foot "danger zone" around the bus, except when you are directed by the driver to get on or off the bus.
- NEVER pick up an object that you drop under or near the bus. Ask the driver for help.
- Always be sure the driver can see you.
- Make sure clothing and backpacks have no loose drawstrings or long straps that could catch in the handrail or the bus door.
- When you see the bus coming, stand at the stop and wait for the bus to come to a complete stop.
- Always wait for the driver to signal that it is safe to cross the road and/or load into the bus.
- When crossing a traffic lane, always look left, right, then left again; cross only if approaching traffic has stopped.
- Never walk behind the bus or along the side of the bus.
- Only board your assigned bus, unless other arrangements are approved by your school.

DURING THE BUS RIDE:

- Always follow the driver's directions.
- Never distract the driver from driving unless there is immediate danger to you or others.
- Remain seated and keep the aisles clear.
- Eating, drinking and chewing gum are prohibited.
- Refrain from using a cell phone unless it is necessary to inform a parent of a bus breakdown, running late or an emergency.
- Never bring unsafe or unauthorized items into the bus.
- Always wear your seat belt if you have one.
- Always keep your arms, legs, and head inside the bus.
- Always show respect for your fellow students.
- Keep conversation at a reasonable level and remain quiet at railroad crossings. The Student Code of Conduct applies in the bus as well as in the classroom.

HEAD START PROGRAM

Brevard Public Schools in collaboration with the Office of Head Start offers a Head Start program for eligible children at selected schools. Head Start programs provide comprehensive services to enrolled children and their families, which include, health, nutrition, social, and other services determined by an assessment of each family's individual needs. Additionally, families receive both education and cognitive development services.. Head Start services are designed to be responsive to each child and family's ethnic, cultural, and linguistic heritage.



Head Start emphasizes the role of parents as their child's first and most important teacher. Head Start programs build relationships with families that support:

- family well-being and positive parent-child relationships
- families as learners and lifelong educators
- family engagement in transitions

- family connections to peers and community, and
- families as advocates and leaders

STEP 1: LETTER OF ELIGIBILITY

- Children must be 3 or 4 years old on or before September 1, 2013
- Eligibility for Head Start is based on family need and federal income guidelines

Families must complete a Head Start Application, available at school sites or on the district website under the Department of Early Childhood, Title 1 and Head Start. The completed application will be sent to the Office of Head Start and the family will be contacted to complete the required documents. You will be asked to bring items including but not limited to the: Child's Birth Certificate, Child's Social Security Card, Child's Medicaid or Insurance Card, Proof of Income, Proof of Brevard County Residency, and Parent/Guardian Photo ID Card or Driver's License.

STEP 2: SCHOOL REGISTRATION

Families must bring a VPK Certificate of Eligibility (for four olds), child's birth certificate, immunization record, current physical, and residence verification to the school assigned on the Head Start Letter of Eligibility. Please note that there are federal requirements for Head Start and that children must be placed using these guidelines.

Head Start classes are held at 10 elementary school sites, 1 high school and 2 stand alone sites. These sites are chosen by utilizing the free lunch program data and the Head Start community assessment. Head Start classes follow the student 180-day calendar of the Brevard County School System. The program opening and closing times are that of each elementary school where the program is housed. Brevard Public Schools with Head Start Programs are listed below.

VOLUNTARY PREKINDERGARTEN PROGRAM

Brevard Public Schools, in collaboration with the Early Learning Coalition of Brevard, offers a Voluntary Prekindergarten Program (VPK) at selected schools with limited enrollment. VPK is a FREE early learning program to prepare four-year-olds for kindergarten and build the foundation for school success. Students must be 4 years old on or before September 1, 2013 and reside in Florida to qualify for the program. Registration for VPK is a two-step process:

STEP 1: CERTIFICATE OF ELIGIBILITY

Parent must obtain a Certificate of Eligibility from the Early Learning Coalition (ELC) by calling ELC at 637-1800 ext. 2002 or 2006 to make an appointment in the Rockledge Office.

Items needed for this appointment will be original or certified copy of the child's birth certificate and current physical address verification where child lives. www.elcbrevard.org.

STEP 2: SCHOOL REGISTRATION BEGINS ON MAY 9

Parents must bring the VPK Certificate of Eligibility, child's birth certificate, immunization record, current physical, and residence verification to the school registration. Please note attendance limitations and space availability. Brevard Public Schools with VPK Programs are listed below.

WHAT IS COMMON CORE?

If you have not yet heard the phrase "Common Core" floating around the education arena, then you soon will. Common Core refers to the Common Core State Standards Initiative, a collaborative effort to provide consistent and clear internationally-benchmarked expectations for student learning in grades K-12. The standards are designed to provide students with real world skills that prepare them to be successful in college and careers.

Florida is one of 45 states, plus three territories, that have voluntarily adopted the *Common Core*. Brevard Public Schools is currently implementing the *Common Core Standards* in Mathematics and English Language Arts (ELA) in kindergarten through second grade. By 2014-2015 *Common Core Standards* will be fully implemented and assessed.

The Parents' Guide to Student Success brochures have been developed by the National PTA in collaboration with national experts for each grade level.

FACTS ABOUT THE COMMON CORE STANDARDS

The Standards are designed to build upon the most advanced current thinking about preparing all students for success in college and their careers. This will result in moving even the best state standards to the next level. In fact, since this work began, there has been an explicit agreement that no state would lower its standards. The Standards were informed by the best in the country, the highest international standards, and evidence and expertise about educational outcomes. We need college and career ready standards because even in high-performing states – students are graduating and passing all the required tests and still require remediation in their postsecondary work.

The Standards are not a curriculum. They are a clear set of shared goals and expectations for what knowledge and skills will help our students succeed. Local teachers, principals, superintendents and others will decide how the standards are to be met. Teachers will continue to devise lesson plans and tailor instruction to the individual needs of the students in their classrooms.

In English-language arts, the Standards require certain critical content for all students, including: classic myths and stories from around the world, America's Founding Documents, foundational American literature, and Shakespeare. Appropriately, the remaining crucial decisions about what content should be taught are left to state and local determination. In addition to content coverage, the Standards require that students systematically acquire literacy skills in all disciplines through reading, writing, speaking, and listening.

In Mathematics, the Standards lay a solid foundation in whole numbers, addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, fractions, and decimals. Taken together, these elements support a student's ability to learn and apply more demanding math concepts and procedures. The middle school and high school standards call on students to practice applying mathematical ways of thinking to real world issues and challenges; they prepare students to think and reason mathematically. The Standards set a rigorous definition of college and career readiness, not by piling topic upon topic, but by demanding that students develop a depth of understanding and ability to apply mathematics to novel situations, as college students and employees regularly do.

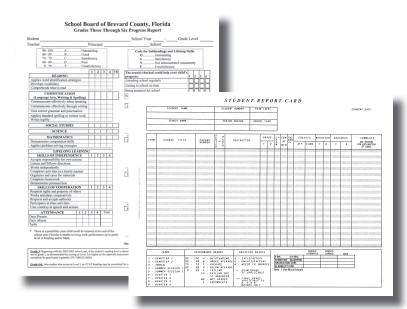

BREVARD PUBLIC SCHOOLS ELEMENTARY INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAM — FALL 2013

The goal of Brevard Public Schools is to educate students in a child-centered environment that promotes and develops literacy and understanding of mathematics, social studies, language arts and scientific concepts. In this environment students are viewed as active participants who are encouraged to explore, manipulate objects, question, take risks, work cooperatively, think, feel, trust, and evaluate themselves. The teacher's role in this environment is to facilitate learning rather than to only dispense knowledge. It is in this environment that students become responsible for their learning and behavior.

GRADE LEVEL STANDARDS

The Common Core State Standards and the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards have been established in the areas of language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. These grade-level standards list key benchmarks for student progress. A representative sample of standards

by grade level has been developed for parents.

ELEMENTARY ENGLISH/LANGUAGE ARTS

The goal of Brevard Public Schools' English/Language Arts Program is to integrate instruction of reading, writing, grammar, and speaking & listening in order to develop and refine students' literacy.

Houghton Mifflin Harcourt Grades for grades K-6 *Florida Journeys Common Core* is the district adopted English/Language Arts textbook series. This program addresses all of the standards related to reading, writing, grammar, and speaking & listening. The instruction is systematic,



balanced, and research-based, building success with every lesson that is introduced and reinforced. Foundational skills are built from kindergarten forward. Deep comprehension tasks include discussion about texts and writing in response to texts. The series provides quality texts, balancing literature and informational reading opportunities for students. Support for differentiated instruction is included.

Writing instruction in the *Florida Journeys Common Core* includes lessons on how to improve students' abilities in the writing process and in responding to what they have read. The standards-based curriculum follows a progression from kindergarten to sixth grade that develops writers who use the craft to learn, think, and communicate across the disciplines, stressing the linkage between writing and reading. These lessons follow a logical sequence to build students' confidence and skill. The qualities of writing are identified through the instruction of Six Traits (Ideas, Organization, Voice, Word Choice, Fluency, and Conventions) and are applied through process writing (planning, drafting, revising, editing, and publishing). This instruction is designed to produce mastery of oral and written communication.

The Spelling component for grades 1-6 of the *Florida Journeys Common Core* program will be used as the district adopted spelling curriculum. This component creates a connection to reading in using words that reflect the vocabulary, word study (etymology, morphology, and syllable types), and phonics components of the grade level texts.

Grammar is addressed in *Florida Journeys Common Core* via embedded lessons relating to writing. The authentic texts included in the textbook provide quality language for study of appropriate grammar and usage in a mentor text method.

In addition to the resources available in *Florida Journeys Common Core* district-created documents are available for additional instruction in literacy.

Lessons must engage students in problem solving activities that enable them to build deep understanding of the mathematical concepts in the standards. The district adopted mathematics program for grades K-S <u>en Vision Math, Florida Common Core 2012/1st</u> for grade 6 is <u>Glencoe McGraw-Hill Florida Math Connects Plus Course I (Florida © 2011)</u>



Both programs have lessons and resources that actively engage students in critical thinking and reasoning. Activities and lessons that support differentiated instruction and Rtl (Response to Intervention) are also offered in within these programs.

The district-adopted textbooks for Kindergarten <u>Pearson's My World Social Studies</u>, grades TK1-5 <u>McGraw-Hill's Florida Studies</u>, and grade 6 <u>McGraw-Hill's Discovering Our Past-A History of the World</u> support the standards-based curriculum by offering tools, information and resources to encourage students to think critically and make conceptual connections to the real world.

ELEMENTARY HEALTH EDUCATION

The goal of the elementary health program in Brevard Public Schools is to develop a health consciousness in all students utilizing a standards based, developmentally appropriate curriculum aimed at enriching their well-being. A K-8 *Health Curriculum Guide* is available to teachers with lessons and activities that can easily be integrated into the core curriculum. This guide is aligned with the Florida Next Generation Sunshine State Standards for Health. Mandated by the Florida Legislature, Brevard Public Schools developed a comprehensive, age and developmentally

Mandated by the Florida Legislature, Brevard Public Schools developed a comprehensive, age and developmentally appropriate, *Human Sexuality Curriculum Guide* for use by teachers in all grade levels.

Beginning in the sixth grade <u>Life Skills Training</u> is introduced. It is a substance abuse prevention program that is comprehensive, interactive and based on 20 years of scientific research. It focuses on self- image, decision making, social and communication skills and peer pressure. Life Skills is aligned with the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards for Math, Science, Language Arts and Social Sciences.

ELEMENTARY PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The goal of elementary physical education in Brevard Public Schools is to provide students with a standards based, balanced, sequential and progressive educational activity program. The program aimed at kindergarten through sixth grade students includes basic movement concepts and skills that are age and developmentally appropriate. This in turn leads to the development of motor skills, knowledge and values, which are needed to establish and maintain a healthy and physically active lifestyle. Aligned with Florida's Next Generation Sunshine State

Standards for Physical Education, the *Elementary Physical Education Curriculum Guide*, *Adapted Physical Education Resource Guide* and *Physical Education Best Practices Brochure* are available to all teachers as the basis for their curriculum. *FITNESSGRAM*- is the physical fitness assessment program used by all Brevard schools. Fitness gram 8.6 and the new web-based 9.2 are the score reporting tools used by Physical Education Teachers to record and monitor each student's fitness levels. Individual FITNESSGRAM report cards are available to all students. Brevard is the first district in Florida to recognize excellence in physical education programs. Currently twelve (12) elementary schools have achieved the Excellence in Physical Education Award. Two of our elementary schools have received national recognition for their excellent programs by achieving the STARS award from the National Association for Sport and Physical Education (NASPE).

ELEMENTARY ART

The goal of the Brevard Public School's art program is to provide instruction and assessment in elementary art that revolves around the development of the elements of art and principles of design. Art activities are both process and product oriented with emphasis placed on inquiry, analysis and integration in art history, critique, aesthetics and production. The program includes individual, cooperative and cross curricular experiences connecting hands-on activities with life skills, and is aligned with Florida's Next Generation Sunshine State Standards to promote the development of critical thinking and innovation as part of 21" Century skills. Schools have several opportunities to participate in various events such as exhibits and contests. The District supports the Area Mall Shows, Art/Science Fairs and the K12 School Board Art Show. Brevard Public Schools participates with the Brevard Cultural Alliance in their Art in Public Places Program and the Artist in Residence Program. Schools are encouraged to participate in the Educational Theatre Programs sponsored by the Maxwell King Center for the Performing Arts. The district adopted series for grades

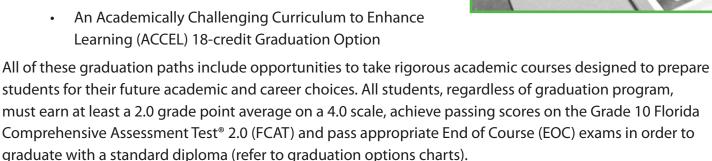

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION PROGRAMS OVERVIEW

If you are the parent of a Florida middle or high school student, this guide is for you. It is designed to explain Florida's high school graduation programs. The guide also provides information to help students and their families as they plan and prepare for postsecondary goals, including information on acceleration options and advanced coursework. For more information about a special diploma and other graduation options for students with disabilities, contact your child's school counselor or exceptional student education teacher, or visit http://www.fldoe.org/ese/.

Florida students entering their first year of high school in the 2013-2014 school year may choose from one of four options to earn a standard diploma. These options are as follows:

- A four-year, 26-credit Graduation Option
- An International Baccalaureate (IB) curriculum
- An Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) curriculum



26-CREDIT GRADUATION OPTION

This program takes the traditional four years to complete high school and requires students to take at least 26 credits in core content areas. Foreign language credit is not required for this program, although it is recommended for Florida college preparation and is required for admission to Florida's state universities. A student may have the option of early graduation if the student meets graduation requirements. "Early graduation" means graduation from high school in less than 8 semesters or the equivalent.

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE (IB) DIPLOMA PROGRAMME

The IB Diploma Programme is a rigorous, pre-university course of study leading to internationally standardized tests. The program's comprehensive, two-year curriculum allows its graduates to fulfill requirements of many different nations' education systems. Students completing IB courses and exams from six subject groups are eligible for college credit. The award of credit is based on scores achieved on IB exams. Students can earn up to 30 postsecondary semester credits by participating in this program at the high school level. Approximately 56 Florida high schools offer an IB Diploma Programme including Cocoa Beach Jr./Sr. and Melbourne High Schools. Students in Florida's public secondary schools enrolled in IB courses do not have to pay to take the exams. For information, visit http://www.ibo.org



ADVANCED INTERNATIONAL CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION (AICE) PROGRAM

The AICE Program is an international curriculum and examination program modeled on the British precollege curriculum. To be considered for an AICE Diploma, a candidate must earn the equivalent of six credits by passing a combination of examinations at either the full (one credit) Advanced Subsidiary Level (AS) or double (two credits) International Advanced Level (A), with at least one course coming from each of the three curriculum areas. Florida's colleges and universities provide college credit for successfully passing the exams. The AICE Program is available at Eau Gallie, Rockledge, and Heritage High Schools. Students in Florida's public

ACCEL 18-CREDIT GRADUATION OPTION

This graduation option is designed for students who are clear about their future goals and are ready to pursue them beyond high school.

To select the ACCEL 18-Credit graduation option, students and their parents must meet with designated school personnel to receive an



explanation of the requirement, advantages, and disadvantages of this option. Students must also receive the written consent of their parents.

ACCELERATION PROGRAMS AND ADVANCED COURSEWORK

Studies show that students who complete a solid academic program in high school, including advanced courses, are more likely to be successful in college. Students in all graduation programs are encouraged to take advantage of advanced course offerings and acceleration programs, such as dual enrollment, early admission, the Advanced Placement Program, the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme, the Advanced International Certificate of Education Program, and the Florida Virtual School. These programs are available to all qualified students. For information, contact your child's school counselor.

DUAL ENROLLMENT AND EARLY ADMISSION

These programs allow eligible high school students to enroll in postsecondary courses. Students earn credit toward high school graduation and, at the same time, earn credit toward a college degree or career certificate. BPS currently articulates with Eastern Florida State College (EFSC) and Florida Institute of Technology (FIT). Students are permitted to take dual enrollment courses on a part-time basis during school hours, after school, or during the summer term (if available). Dual enrollment students attending EFSC do



not have to pay registration, tuition, or laboratory fees; in addition, textbooks for dual enrollment are provided to students by BPS. Dual enrollment courses will be weighted the same as courses taught through other acceleration mechanisms. Students should be aware that grades received through dual enrollment become part of the permanent postsecondary record. State universities will not admit a student who has less than a 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) PROGRAM

The College Board's AP Program is a nationwide program consisting of more than 30 college-level courses and exams offered at participating high schools. Subjects range from art to statistics. Students who earn a qualifying grade of three or above on an AP exam can earn college credit, or AP credit, or both, depending on the college or university. Students in Florida's public secondary schools enrolled in AP courses do not have to pay to take the exams. For information, visit http://www.collegeboard.com/student/testing/ap/about.html.



FLORIDA VIRTUAL SCHOOL (FVS)

The FVS offers high-quality, online high school curricula, including AP courses. The FVS Program can be a resource for students with limited access to AP offerings. For information, visit http://www.flvs.net.

ADULT EDUCATION

COLLEGE-LEVEL EXAMINATION PROGRAM (CLEP)

Students with strong content background in a subject area can earn credit through an examination program administered by the college they attend. One such program is the College-Level Examination Program (CLEP). Candidates for the CLEP include students who have completed an AP course but did not take or earn a qualifying score on the AP exam. Other students who have taken several high school courses in one particular subject area may wish to take a CLEP exam. For more information on CLEP testing sites and dates, contact the admissions or registrar's office at the postsecondary institution in your area.

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION

Today's rigorous and relevant Career and Technical Education (CTE) prepares students for a wide range of high-skill, high-wage, and high-demand careers as well as further educational opportunities. CTE is offered in middle schools, high schools, and at the postsecondary level through dual enrollment. CTE is at the forefront of preparing students to be "college and career ready" by equipping students with core academic skills and the ability to apply those skills to concrete situations. Students also learn employability skills such as critical thinking and responsibility in addition to job-specific, technical skills. Each CTE program offers

students the opportunity to earn an industry-recognized credentials and certifications which are recognized and valued by business and industry partners. Brevard's goal is that every student will graduate from high school prepared to enter and be successful in the workplace, in further career education, and/or in postsecondary degree opportunities. PARENT ENGAGEMENT

PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT IN THE SCHOOLS BOARD **POLICY 2111**

The Board recognizes that a child's education is a responsibility shared by the school and family during the entire period the child spends in school. To support the goal of the school district to educate all students effectively, the schools and parents must work as knowledgeable partners.

The child's first and most important teacher is the parent. Home and school partnerships should help to strengthen this role.

Although parents/families may be diverse in culture, language, and needs, they share the school's commitment to the educational success of their children. This school district and the schools within its boundaries, in collaboration with parents/families, shall establish programs and practices that enhance parent involvement and reflect the specific needs of students and their families.

To this end, the Board supports the development, implementation, and regular evaluation of a parent involvement program in each school, which will involve parents at all grade levels in a variety of roles. The parent/family involvement programs will be comprehensive and coordinated in nature. They will include, but not be limited to, the following components of successful parent/family involvement programs:

- Communication between home and school is regular, two-way, and meaningful.
- Responsible parenting is promoted and supported.
- Parents/families play an integral role in assisting student learning.
- Parents/families are welcome in the school, and their support and assistance are sought.
- Parents/families are partners in the decision-making process that affect children and families.

For the benefit of the child, the Board believes that parents have a responsibility to encourage their child's career in school by:

- Supporting the schools in requiring their child observe all school rules and regulations, and by accepting their own responsibility for their child's school behavior;
- Sending their children to school with proper attention to his/her health, personal cleanliness, and dress;
- Maintaining an active interest in their child's daily work and making it possible for him/her to complete assigned homework by providing a quiet place and suitable conditions for study;
- Reading all communications from the school, signing, and returning them promptly when required;
- Cooperating with the school in attending conferences set up for the exchange of information of their child's progress in school.

The Board supports professional development opportunities for staff members to enhance understanding



of effective parent involvement strategies. The Board also recognizes the importance of administrative leadership in setting expectations and creating a climate conducive to parental and family participation.

In addition to programs at the school level, the Board supports the development, implementation, and regular evaluation of a program to involve parents in the decisions and practices of the school district, using to the degree possible, and the components listed above.

PARENT NOTIFICATIONS

RIGHT TO REQUEST INFORMATION

Every parent has the right to request information about the professional qualifications of the student's teacher(s) and any teacher assistants who serve the student. This information will be provided by the administrative office at the child's school upon request.

PARENT NOTIFICATION REGARDING NON-HIGHLY QUALIFIED TEACHERS



No Child Left Behind (federal education law) requires us to notify the parent when a teacher who is not qualified teaches your child for four consecutive weeks. If this occurs, your child's school will send home a letter giving you information regarding your child's teacher.

In accordance with the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (NCLB) the district and each school receiving Title I, Part A funds must develop a Parental Involvement Plan (PIP). The plans will be summarized in brochures printed in English and Spanish and distributed to all parents of students served

by Title I, Part A. The district PIP, as well as the summary brochure, may be accessed on the District website at: http://title1.brevard.k12.fl.us/parent_involvement.htm or requested in hard copy from the Office of Title I by calling Gevonne Blum at 633-1000, ext. 336. Title I School PIPs, as well as summary brochures, may be accessed on the school websites or by request at the front office.

OPT-OUT PROVISION

Brevard Public Schools has a policy to safeguard students' directory information from being released to commercial entities, non-profit agencies or individuals. This information includes student:

- date of graduation or program completion
- date and place of birth
- names
- addresses
- phone numbers
- participation in school activities and sports
- honors and awards
- height and weight of athletic team members
- dates of attendance

The district takes the responsibility of safeguarding your child's school records very seriously and follows state and federal regulations regarding the release of such information. "Directory Information," as defined by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), allows the disclosure of certain student

information including names and addresses, without prior written consent, unless a parent has opted out. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the district to include this type of information from your child's records in certain school publications. Examples include graduation lists, recognition lists, sports activity sheets, and playbills.

In accordance with School Board Policy 8330, if you do not want Brevard Public Schools to disclose your child's allowable directory information, without your prior written consent, you must notify the district in writing. FOOD & NUTRITION SERVICES—FUELING THE FUTURE

SCHOOL NUTRITION

Brevard Public Schools (BPS) Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) serves over 19,900 breakfasts and 32,000 lunches each day in the district's 82 school cafeterias. During the 2012-2013 year, more than 3.5 million breakfasts and 5.7 million lunches were served in our school cafeterias. For the past



13 years, FNS has participated in the Provision 2 Breakfast Program that enables us to provide a no cost breakfast to all students.



EATING HEALTHY IS IMPORTANT

All meals are planned by a Registered Dietitian and meet U.S.D.A. standards. Breakfast meals include a choice of entree made with whole grains, a variety of fruit and low-fat or fat-free milk. New regulations implemented in 2012 have positively impacted the school lunch program. Students are now required to select a fruit or vegetable; at least half of the grains offered must be whole grains and efforts are underway to reduce sodium levels. Fresh Fruit, steamed vegetables, healthy choice entrees, and a vegetarian option are available daily. Whole grain items include breads, rolls, tortillas, brown rice, pizza crust, corn dogs and chicken nuggets. All baked goods sold a' la carte are reduced in calories and sugar. A' la carte standards for elementary and secondary schools are defined in the district's Wellness Policy and Procedures Manual.

TITLE I

TITLE I VISION

Title I provides support through resources and research-based training, enabling schools to develop high quality, enriched programs that meet the individual needs of all children, families, and staff.

By providing a positive, caring environment with high educational expectation, Title I ensures that all individuals feel capable, connected, and able to make worthwhile contributions to their community.

TITLE I GOALS

- Assist schools in meeting the goal of consistent growth in student achievement.
- Support schools in the implementation of high quality, research-based literacy programs.
- Support schools' efforts to provide extended learning opportunities.



- Support schools' efforts to implement a comprehensive program for lower achieving students.
- Implement high quality early childhood programs for four year olds in schools with a high concentration of at-risk children.
- Support school efforts to implement the Early Childhood Standards of Excellence for prekindergarten.
- Enhance opportunities for parents/families to learn ways they can support their children's educational progress from birth to grade twelve.
- Assist district and schools in meeting requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB).

Title I is a federally funded program designed to improve achievement at schools with a high percentage of students eligible for free and reduced priced lunches. To qualify for school wide program status, a school must meet the criteria of a free and reduced lunch percentage of 55% or higher. The Title I project serves 37 Brevard Public School sites and 16 private schools in Brevard County.

Each participating school has designed its own program, including grade levels and subject areas to be served, instructional models, and staffing plan based upon the unique needs of students at that school.

Each school coordinates the Title I plan with the school improvement plan. Copies of each school plan are available upon request from the Title I Office or the individual school.

COORDINATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES:

Title I coordinates services with other agencies throughout Brevard County. These agencies include Brevard Zoo, Eastern Florida State College, Head Start, Adult Education, PREVENT!, Juvenile Justice, Rolling Readers, University of Central Florida, English for Speakers of Other Languages, and for homeless students and their families.



ENGLISH FOR SPEAKERS OF OTHER LANGUAGE (ESOL)

IDENTIFICATION AND PLACEMENT

Parents fill out a Home Language Survey during registration. A comprehensive English language proficiency screening is administered when there is an indication that another language spoken at home might have impacted the student proficiency in English. Students who meet eligibility for the program are placed in their appropriate grades with ESOL endorsed or in-training teachers.



INSTRUCTIONAL MODEL

BPS provides instruction to English Language Learners (ELL) using a mainstream inclusion model in which instruction is delivered through the use of ESOL strategies and accommodations. The goal is to provide differentiated instruction to develop sufficient verbal skills, listening, reading, and writing to enable the student to become English proficient.

English Language Learners are taught the same grade level curriculum. All subjects are presented in comparable amount of scope, sequence, and quality to those provided to students in the regular program. The language proficiency of the ELL student is taken into consideration during lesson planning, instruction, assessment, and grading.

SUPPLEMENTAL ASSISTANCE

Internal funds and the federal Title III grant help provide the following support to schools and their various ELL students:

- 3 itinerant teachers for supplemental academic support and monitoring in non-staffed schools.
- a bilingual assistant for any school with an enrollment of 15 ELL of the same home language
- an ESOL teacher for any school with an enrollment of 50 active ELL students
- an ESOL parent liaison for community outreach programs
- quality professional development for instructional staff & contacts
- supplemental online programs for language acquisition and reading
- supplemental online programs for support in core classes
- supplemental classroom teaching materials
- ESOL tutoring

PROGRESS MONITORING

The ELL Committee headed by the ESOL Contact at every school monitors the progress of all students in the program. Parents are advised to participate actively in scheduled meetings and events.

ELL students participate in all of BCPS and Florida Department of Education's assessments using approved testing accommodations. In addition, the Comprehensive English Language Learner Assessment (CELLA) is administered annually to all ELL students to monitor progress towards English language mastery.

TIPS FOR PARENTS

We strongly encourage ESOL parents to be better advocates for their students by:



- knowing their rights
- requesting information in their home language whenever feasible
- identifying and communicating with the school's ESOL contact as needed
- having access to Edline for continuous monitoring and instant translation
- participating actively in the various school/district procedures and events
- verifying their student participation to the available supplemental resources
- talking to their ELL students regularly about school, their classroom, teachers, and friends

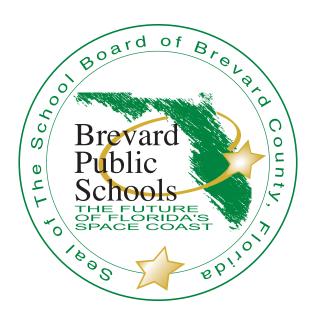
